

CHAP 19

June 1, 1977

KALBFLEISCH transported Douglas Wilson, of [redacted] Troy D.O.B. [redacted] to the offices of Dr. Rossi for the purposes of being interviewed under hypnosis. Doug Wilson had related to friends that he believed he was there the night Tim King was taken Chatham market. That he remembered seeing a young boy on a skate board. That he remembered an individual sitting in the car watching the children and at the time he observed the young boy and his skate board another individual somewhat resembling the composite was standing by Chatham market watching the boy. Under hypnosis Doug Wilson indicated that he parked his vehicle, a red Alfa Romeo, at the rear of Chatham market. That he observed a young boy going down the parking lot grade riding a skate board. The boy appeared to be around 7 or 8 years of age. He was very small. That he observed the boy jump off the skate board as he approached the back wall of Chatham market and the skate board had run into the wall. He related he was quite a distance from the young man but he believed he was wearing gym shoes, possibly blue pants. Further indicated he remembered a jacket and something about stripes. Due to the size of Tim, the fact he was wearing dark green pants, which could be confused at a distance with blue and that the red jacket he was wearing did have stripes on the sleeves, there is a possibility he did observe go down and run into the back of the building. He stated at this point he saw another white male, approximately 30 years of age, 5' 10" to 6' 0" with dark hair going to the nap of the neck and partially covering the ears with dark eyebrows, wearing casual clothes, but could only remember the jacket which he described as a brown jacket, light weight with smooth finish, possibly a wind breaker watching the boy. He stated at that time he felt it might be the boys father watching his son on the skate board and paid no further attention to this individual. He further stated during the interview and reiterated under hypnosis that after locking his own personal car he observed a man in another car who appeared to be watching the children. Under hypnosis he stated the car was not a Chrysler product, it was American made, that he got the impression it was a [redacted] less, that being the intermediate Oldsmobile, that it was one color and he could not

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was watching. Douglas stated that he had observed the license number and made up a little jingle to remember it, but once leaving the supermarket seeing no damage to his car he dismissed the number. Under hypnosis he gave two possible licenses. One being GBR-222, which he indicated would be GRRER 222 would be the jingle to remember that number. Under further interrogation he came up with the license number GJR-222. After the interview, both numbers were checked by LEIN. License GBR-222 registers on a '69 Ford 2 dr. to [redacted] License # GJR-222 registers on a '70 Plymouth 4 dr. to [redacted]. Due to time limitations the attempt for further description of the man in the car and the man near the wall that the young lad was seen with were not completed. Arrangements have been made for another interview on June 9th at 9:00 AM with Dr. Rossi and Trooper Powell will be present to attempt to get an artist's conception of the two subjects. Sgt. Krasak is running alterations of the license numbers through the Secretary of State to determine if any meet the description given by witness Douglas Wilson.

June 2, 1977

Douglas Wilson was again put under hypnosis by Dr. Rossi and drawings were made of the two men he saw in the Chatham parking lot on the night in question. The drawings were made by Sgt. Powell of the MSP. Wilson also stated that he had no reason to believe that the two men were together except his own feeling that two persons were involved in the child abductions. 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June 9, 1977

4 January 77 (continued) - and now he is lodged in the Clinton Township P.D. Jail pending his arraignment for driving on a suspended license. [redacted] advised that [redacted] worked the 8am to 5pm shift on 22, 23 and 24 of December 1976 with no problems. On the 25th of December 1976 he worked the 10am to 2pm shift. However, at this time he was intoxicated although he was present for work. On the 26th of December he did not work.

Officers then contacted [redacted] at [redacted] is the landlady where [redacted] resides. She advised that [redacted] was home every evening from the 22nd until the 24th of December, at which time he went to a party on Christmas Eve. She advised that he did not have a car and walked to and from his place of employment, which is about three blocks away.

Officers contacted [redacted] at [redacted] telephone of [redacted] advised that she has been keeping company with [redacted] for some time. On Christmas Eve they attended a party together and became involved in an argument, at which time she put [redacted] out of her home because he had had too much to drink. She advised that she did not see [redacted] again until this morning, 4 Jan 77, at which time he stopped by her home and borrowed her car. She then received a telephone call a short time

later from the Clinton Township P.D. that _____ had been involved in an accident with her car. She advised that on occasion _____ had used her car but she had always been with him. She advised that during the 22nd, 23rd, until the evening of the 24th of December, when she was with him, _____ did not have her car.

As a result of the above investigation officers have eliminated _____ as a suspect in this investigation.

5 January 77 - Undersigned officer spent the bulk of this day going over the reports and tips with officers of the Troy P.D. and endeavored to bring the complaint up to date.

6 January 77 - Troy P.D. is in receipt of information from a motorist who was traveling northbound on I-75 in the early morning hours of 26 Dec 76. He stated that he observed a light blue 1967 Pontiac Tempest, this vehicle was first observed by the motorist parked on the shoulder of I-75 north of 12 Mile Road. He observed two people in the car, but could give no further description. As he passed the vehicle it pulled back on to I-75 and continued northbound until just north of Big Beaver Road in the area where the victim was found. The Tempest pulled on to the shoulder of the road and stopped again. The motorist advised that he continued on his way and could give no further information. He did state that he was certain of the year of the car as he had owned one previously and that the paint on the car was faded and the right tail lens was broken in the corner, emitting a white light.

As a result of the above information Troy P.D. contacted the Secretary of State
